

Fall 2022 Keynote Speaker

Andrew Giles Buckley discusses Hit and Run History's adventure-travel documentary on Mayflower pilgrim Stephen Hopkins, *Stephano: The True Story of Shakespeare's Shipwreck*.

Two-time Emmy-nominated producer and host Andrew Giles Buckley, a Hopkins descendant, grew up hearing stories that New Plymouth's iconoclast tavern keeper may have the model of *The Tempest's* drunken and mutinous Stephano. In their Gumshoe Historian style, Buckley and the crew of *Hit and Run History* seek out the reality of a man who was everywhere at the founding of America.

The film follows the story of the only *May-flower* passenger who had been to North American previously. A decade earlier, Hopkins had been aboard a Jamestown-bound ship that wrecked on Bermuda, inspiring Shakespeare's final play, *The Tempest*.

The Board of Assistants decided to modernize our website with a new and improved membership management system called Wild Apricot. You can start now to enjoy the public view of the updated website by going to https://virginiamayflower.org/

You should have received an e-mail inviting you to establish a password associated with your e-mail address. It's a quick and easy process and once you are set up, you will be able to view members-only content, including upcoming Society meetings, the up-to-date Society roster with built-in messaging to other members, and archival records. Please note that your password is unique to you and will allow you to access the Members Only section of the web page. The previous access to the members' page, using a single password for all members, will no longer work. Each member must create their own password as soon as they receive the invitation email.

A key feature of our new website is that members will be able to make online payments of annual membership renewals, event payments, and donations to the Society. That is significant because it eliminates writing checks, mailing checks to the right address, and adding postage.

While the online system is intended to provide a level of convenience to the many who have requested online capabilities, we will still offer traditional methods of conducting Society business (e.g. accepting checks as payment of dues, donations, and other fees). We are not compelling any member to use the new online capabilities if they choose not to do so. Your Board of Assistants adopted this new Wild Apricot cloud-based software to help simplify and automate our Society administrative tasks for the convenience of members. Shot on location, the intrepid *Hit and Run History* crew retraces Hopkins' life criss-crossing the emerging Atlantic world. England, Bermuda, Jamestown, Plymouth – Hopkins' came to know Native Americans in New World and Old. Pocahontas, Squanto and Massasoit – experience that would serve him and the Separatists aboard the *Mayflower* in establishing their fledgling settlement in New England.

The film was first broadcast on Rhode Island PBS in 2020 and has been screened at the Pilgrim Hall Museum, Cape Cod Museum of Natural History, Folger Shakespeare Library in Washington, DC, and other public media stations across the country.

Due to the length of the film, it will not be possible to show it during the luncheon meeting. However, you will have the opportunity to view it from the comfort of your own home, if you like.

Turkey Napkin Holders ... and Family Keepsakes

This craft made by younger Mayflower Juniors with a little pre-planning. Older Juniors will also take pride in making the napkin holders for their Thanksgiving tables and will be great assistants for the younger artisans. Year after year, these napkin holders will be a source of debate: which was made by whom? Names may secretly be written inside, and any debate can be settled during dessert each year!

Supplies you will need:

- empty bathroom tissue tubes
- brown or grey felt (enough for tubes) and one square of orange or yellow felt for beaks
- black, grey, tan and/or brown pom pom balls (1-2" in diameter) for the heads
- wiggly or googly eyes
- fabric glue

Cut the brown felt into $4-\frac{1}{4}$ x 6 inch pieces. Cut small triangles for beak. Glue onto tube and overlap slightly. If needed, trim excess felt along the bottom of the tube for stability. Small children can take it from here ... Glue a pom pom for the head, near the top of the felt covered tube. Glue googly eyes to the heads. Lay tube flat with heads facing upward to allow the heads and eyes to dry.

When the glue is dry, fold napkins as you would to make a paper fan. Holding one folded end of the napkin, insert about two inches into the top of the tube. Spread the accordion pleats for an open tail.



From the Bookshelves ~ Virginia Mayflower Society Book Club

The Virginia Mayflower Society held it first virtual book club meeting this summer. We selected the 2020 book by author Carla Gardina Pestana, *The World of Plymouth Plantation*. This small but information-packed 230 page book, gives insight into the early years of the *Mayflower* passengers as they worked to create a home.



The author included 6 chapters; each with three topics. In each section, she

gives examples of how our ancestors lived and provides many examples of the perceptions of and interactions between two cultures- the English and the Wampanoag. From the struggles of creating families, hunting and growing crops, the export of goods back to England, and religious beliefs, this book covers topics about our early ancestors in New England that many may not be familiar with.

The book is well sourced and a joy to read. Our small group met three times beginning in May and concluding in July. Our hour discussions covered two chapters at a time. Not only did we learn from our own reading, but because we brought different experiences and knowledge to our discussions, we also learned from each other.

The Captain's Manifest

William Mullins was born about 1572 in perhaps in Dorking, Surry, England. He was the son of John Mullins and Joan Bridger. He was a shoemaker by trade based upon the items left in his estate. He left 21 dozen shoes and 13 pair of boots which he left to the Company, upon his death (*REF 1*)

William married Alice by 1593 (assuming she is the mother of all four children). It has not been proven that she is the mother of all of his children (*REF 1*). No marriage date has been located for William and Alice. Only William, his wife Alice, son Joseph and daughter Priscilla came on the trip.

In May 1619, William sold his Dorking manor holdings. The property consisted of a house and 1.5 acres of land and outbuildings (*REF 3*). It was located between West Street and Back Street (now Church Street). This may have been in preparation for his trip on the Mayflower. By this time he was making a good living as a shoemaker. He must have had some wealth as he had made one of the larger investments in the joint-stock company Plymouth (*REF 2*)

The first winter was a difficult one and half of the Mayflower passengers perished that first year. Priscilla was the only member of the family left. In his will, he left his son in England, William his share of land in Virginia should he come. He did not come. He married three times and left no children. William died in 1674. William's other daughter Sarah, was married in 1621, but is believed to have remained in England (*REF 1*). In addition to the death of most of the Mullins family, their servant Robert Carter also died that first winter (*REF 2*) William was the first to die on 21 February 1620/1. His will was carried back on the Mayflower to England. His wife and son were still alive at the time that the Mayflower set sail back to England on 2 April 1621 (*REF 3*) Mullin's will was discovered in the late 19 th century by Henry F. Waters (*REF 3*), still survives today and was witnessed by master Christopher Jones and Giles Heale (*REF 2*).



Two "Must-Haves" For Your Reference Library

Reference volumes are just that: books to refer to. A three-volume resource and a later compendium make up an important section on my genealogy shelves—*The Great Migration Begins: Immigrants to New England, 1620-1633* Vols. I to III and *The Great Migration Directory*. What are the benefits to be found in these references? Look at your early family tree. What about the father of the woman who married your Mayflower descen-



dant's grandson? When did he arrive? Where was he from? Likely you could find the beginning of that connection in these books.

These references are a valuable addition to even an amateur family researcher's library. They are a gold mine of information not just on Mayflower passengers, but on their later arriving family, friends, fellow congregants, neighbors, and future spouses.

The Great Migration Begins, published in 1995, covers arrivals in the years 1620 to 1633, so the settling of Plymouth and its surrounds can be seen in each entry. I bought the books to research later arriving ancestors, both mine and my husband's, and found many of his mother's family arrived in considerable numbers

during what is called the Great Migration. It is convenient to have their data in one reference source.

Started in 1988, The Great Migration Project, spearheaded by genealogist and author Robert Charles Anderson, set a goal to present "a concise and reliable summary of past research of early immigrants."

The Project was an "immense literature search" which now provides an invaluable resource for research into early New England ancestors. The

Great Migration Begins tries to "document each life" (viii) by presenting the researched origin, means of migration, residence, status, education, offices, and estate of the immigrant. Entries are alphabetical across the three volumes and include birth, death, marriage, children, and associations with other immigrants. This information is gleaned from "records generated by 14 May 1634" and by appearances in the immediate family of a person recorded as arriving by the end of 1633 (xv). This includes more than nine hundred families or unattached men and women (xvi).

The author makes clear in his introduction that he is conservative in his inclusions, making corrections to misinformation



often preserved in family genealogies by the repetition of erroneous, non-substantiated data.

The Great Migration Directory, published in 2015, has shorter, more concise entries as would be expected in a directory, but it spans more years, covering the full 20 years of the Great Migration—1620-1640. The Great Migration Project eventually noted over 20,000 Englishmen arriving in New England from the Mayflower's arrival to the beginning of the English Civil War. Approximately 85% of these immigrants

came from 1634 to 1640. The Great Migration Directory lists about 5600 families or individuals (x). Neither those arrivals who were transients nor those mentioned in records who remained in England were mentioned in either resource.

The Great Migration Begins, all three volumes, costs for \$79.95. But you can find it as a reference on Ancestry.com and on Americanancestors.org. Of course, one must be a member to access these sites.

The Great Migration Directory costs \$64.95. They are well worth the purchase price.

Proposed Amendments to the Constitution and By-Laws

November 2022

This is a notice of PROPOSED AMENDMENTS to the Constitution and By-Laws of the Society of Mayflower Descendants in the Commonwealth of Virginia as required by CONSTITUTION. AMENDMENTS. ARTICLE XII, and BY-LAWS. AMENDMENTS TO BY-LAWS. Article VI. The following four proposed amendments are to be presented for consideration and action during the Society's Compact Day Luncheon in Richmond, VA, November 19, 2022.

Note: Deletions are in **bold** and insertions are underscored.

1. Amend CONSTITUTION, Membership, Article III, Section 3 by striking "Every approval by the Historian shall be void unless the lineage papers shall be filed by the applicant, properly filled out, within nine months after the same shall have been sent him." and restating it as follows "Once an applicant has paid the state and Society fees and a draft application has been created, the applicant shall have two years to complete the process of providing evidence for the application after which the application process shall be considered terminated. After that date a new application and fees must be submitted by the applicant to the Society. The time limit may be extended due to special circumstances."

Article III, Section 3 currently reads:

"Every approval by the Historian shall be void unless the lineage papers shall be filed by the applicant, properly

filled out, within nine months after the same shall have been sent him."

As amended, Article III, Section 3 will read:

"Once an applicant has paid the state and Society fees and a draft application has been created, the applicant shall have two years to complete the process of providing evidence for the application after which the application process shall be considered terminated. After that date a new application and fees must be submitted by the applicant to the Society. The time limit may be extended due to special circumstances."

Rationale: To provide adequate time to complete applications and to clarify long-standing practices. This change is urged by our current Historian, Debbie Misiag.

2. Amend BYLAWS, Article I, Section 1(election at the Triennial) by inserting "provided however, that any Historian, Co-Historian, or

Assistant Historian may be elected at any annual meeting when the Board of Assistants recommends such election" at the end of the first sentence

Article I, Section 1 currently reads

"The officers of the Society shall be elected at the triennial November meeting of the Society by a majority of the votes actually cast at the meetings. When only one nominee is put up, the chair can take a voice vote, or can declared that the nominee is elected."

As amended, Article I, Section 1 will read:

"The officers of the Society shall be elected at the triennial November meeting of the Society by a majority of the votes actually cast at the meetings, provided, however, that any Historian, Co-Historian, or Assistant Historian may be elected at any annual meeting when the Board of Assistants recommends such election. When only one nominee is proposed, the chair can take a voice vote, or can declare that the nominee is elected."

Rationale: To create staggered terms for Historian, Co-Historian, and Assistant Historians and to clarify duties.

3. Amend BYLAWS, Article I, Section 2 (three-year term for officers) by inserting "provided, however, that any Historian, Co-Historian, or Assistant Historian may be elected for one or two year terms when the Board of Assistants recommends this in order to create a series of staggered terms." at the end of the sentence.

Draft Minutes

Call to Order:

The Meeting was called to order at 12:45 pm by GSMD-VA Governor Lee Hardin Woody, followed by the invocation and blessing given by Captain W. Samuel Williams, in the absence of Nancy Barrow, Elder. Deputy Governor Tim Finton led the Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag of the United States of America. The Pilgrim Pledge followed led by Captain W. Samuel Williams. The Past Governors and Head Table were then introduced.

After a delicious luncheon, Governor Woody announced that Mary Ann Jung, a Susannah White interpreter, was unable to be with us, but will be back another time.

Introduction of Speaker:

Governor Woody introduced our keynote speaker, GSMD Governor General Jane Riddell Hurt. She stated that Governor Hurt, who is from Kansas, is head of our 31, 000+ member group, and also belongs to other lineage groups including the Jamestowne Society, NSDAR, Daughters of American Colonists, and Colonial Dames 17th Century. Her qualifying ancestor was Peregrine White.

Program:

In her talk Governor General Hurt stated that she was only the 4th woman to be Governor General, and warmly mentioned our own Mildred Ramos, who was the very first. She gave us a history of the insignia of the Governor General and discussed the importance of the various GSMD real estate holdings in Plymouth. Restoration of the historic Mayflower Society House is ongoing and complicated. Governor Hurt also gave us information about a \$2.618 million dollar grant received by the GSMD for the restoration of a church to become an education center. After the Governor General concluded her remarks, Governor Woody presented her with an honorarium of \$1000 to GSMD in honor of the Governor General Jane Groves Riddell Hurt to go towards the Mayflower Society House historical restorations.

The Roll Call of Passengers was led by Debbie Misiag, Historian.

Approval of Minutes:

Governor Woody asked for approval of the minutes of the November 2021 meeting, which were circulated in the newsletter. There was a motion and second, with the minutes being unanimously approved.

Reports:

Assistant Treasurer, Jan Sullivan-reported that the per capita had been paid to the GSMD with over \$102,000 in the treasury.

Historian, Debbie Misiag-reported that the training of the Historian's Team is progressing well. There are 29 new applications, 160 applications in process, for a total of 189. There are 46 new members since the November meeting, with a "turn around" in time in Plymouth of eight months.

Mildred Ramos Scholarship Presentation, Karen Pogoloff-Chairman Pogoloff gave an informative history of the scholarship, which was established in 2012 "To encourage and support the study of the Mayflower Pilgrim experience and values." The annual scholarship gives \$1620 to a high school senior, a college undergraduate or graduate student under 25 years of age. The Chairman then introduced this year's recipient, who is Anuj Khemka of Alexandria, Virginia who remarked on his paper which addressed the question:

"Nearly every year from 1621 to 1625, more colonists were sent from England to join the Plymouth Colony. Were these additional people an asset or cause of problems?"

Anuj eloquently supported the argument that this weakened the colony and was not an asset.

The Khemka family was in attendance.

New/Unfinished Business:

Governor Woody announced the Wild Apricot transition for payments and membership management. She also thanked all involved in planning this meeting and for all the hard work of the committees.

Governor Woody announced the dates of the GSMD meeting in Minneapolis September 7-11 and invited any member who is interested to attend.

The 2022 Compact Meeting will be Saturday November 19 at the Commonwealth Club in Richmond. Andrew Buckley is the speaker, who produced the film, "Stephano: The True Story of Shakespeare's Shipwreck".

The 2022 Spring Speaker Series Sponsors were announced and thanked.

The Benediction was given by Captain W. Samuel Williams.

Governor General Woody asked for a motion and second for adjournment, which was voted upon unanimously.

The 2022 Mildred Ramos Scholarship Awarded

The Mildred Ramos Scholarship Fund was established in 2012 to encourage and support the study of the Mayflower Pilgrim experience and values. It was named to honor Miss Mildred Ramos, who has faithfully served both the Mayflower Descendants in the Commonwealth of Virginia and the General Society of Mayflower Descendants in a variety of roles since being elected to membership in April 1967 based on her lineal descent from Stephen Hopkins. In 1973 she was elected to serve for three years as the Governor of Virginia Society. She was elected Governor General of the General Society in 1990, having previously served as Deputy Governor General and Secretary General.

This annual scholarship of \$1,620 is awarded to a high school senior, home school equivalent, or a college undergraduate or graduate student under 25 years old. The awardee must be a Virginia resident, related to a Virginia resident, or a member of the Virginia Mayflower Society. Additionally, the candidate must have at least a B grade point average and be sponsored by a current teacher, school counselor, or member of the Society.

Each year a new essay subject is selected by the Scholarship Committee. This year the question posed was "Nearly every year from 1621 to 1625, more colonists were sent from England to join the Plymouth Colony. Were these additional people an asset or a cause of problems?" The consensus opinion in the scholarship essays was that they were not an asset!


