Our speaker this spring will be Reid Dunavant. If you are a fan of the Antique

Roadshow, you have probably watched him appraise antique silver and other items. Mr. Dunavant's topic will be "Auction And Appraisal Discoveries, The Inside Story" which will include a behind the scenes glimpse of the Antiques Roadshow as well as what's hot and what's not in the Art and Antiques world and a few discovery tales of treasures Mr. Dunavant has uncovered in his nearly 2 decades as an appraiser for Doyle Auctioneers and Appraisers and the Antiques Roadshow. You will have an opportunity to ask questions throughout the talk rather than at the end. This program promises to be a treat that you will not want to miss!

We will also award our seventh Mildred Ramos Scholarship at the Spring Meeting. This year's essay topic is "The Pilgrims first landed near what is now Provincetown at the eastern end of Cape Cod, and as they traveled west along the inner shore of the Cape they, like Champlain in 1606, had encounters with hostile Indians. However, after settling at Plymouth the Pilgrims received help from the Pokanokets Indians and became allies of their chief, Massasoit. What were the causes of the good relations between the Pilgrims and the Indians near Plymouth?" The Board of Assistants continues to be thankful to all who have supported our scholarship program with your very generous donations as well as your support of our silent auctions. The 2017 Fall Silent Auction took in \$282. The mission of the Mildred Ramos Scholarship is to encourage and support the study of the Mayflower Pilgrim experience and values.

Mr. Dunavant lectures frequently on a broad range of topics including specific collecting areas such as Antique Silver to general collecting trends. In addition, Mr. Dunavant has shared his expertise as an appraiser on the popular television series Antiques Roadshow for over thirteen consecutive seasons from 2004-2017.

Mr. Dunavant supports various arts organizations including the Sitar Arts Center in Washington, D.C. which provides quality arts education to low income youth.

Draft Minutes of the Virginia Mayflower Society's Fall 2017 Luncheon at the Commonwealth Club in Richmond, Virginia on November 18, 2017

Governor Lee Woody called the meeting to order at 12:40 p.m. and welcomed those in attendance, including first time attendees and guests. Elder Nancy Barrow offered the Invocation and Blessing.

Captain Channing Zucker led the assembly in the Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag of the United States of America and the Pilgrim Pledge.

Assistant Historian Deborah Shea read the Mayflower Compact. Past Governor Betty Diakun shared the story of the "Five Kernels of Corn."

Governor Lee Woody introduced those seated at the head table: Elder Nancy Barrow, Secretary Rebekah Fleury, guest speaker John A. Caramia, Jr., Historian James Callender, Deputy Governor James Maloney and Captain Channing Zucker. She also introduced Former Governor General and Past Governor Mildred Ramos, Past Governor Mark Cox, Past Governor Betty Diakun and Past Governor Martha Ellen Brockner who were also present.

Governor Woody reported that our Speaker Committee Chair, Capt. Channing Zucker, has been working hard to create a list of speakers for our meetings. The Education Committee has worked to create a list of suggested children's books and online educational resources. She encouraged all members to complete the Spring Meeting Survey and to donate to the "Pennies For Planks" campaign; a challenge from the Connecticut Mayflower Society to other member societies to raise money to help restore the Mayflower II.

Scholarship Committee Chair James Maloney announced that silent auction items to benefit the Mildred Ramos Scholarship Fund would be available for bids during the luncheon. The 2018 essay topic will explore the question of what caused the good relationship between the Pilgrims and the Indians near Plymouth.

After a recess for luncheon, the meeting reconvened. Speaker Committee Chair Capt. Channing Zucker introduced the guest speaker, Mr. John A. Caramia, Jr., who retired in June 2015, after 33 years in the museum field. He currently serves on two Boards, the Mathews County Historical Society and the Mathews County Historical Museum, which is in the process of developing a new museum for the county. His topic on Coffee, Tea & Spirits in the Colonial World was highly informative and entertaining. At the close of his presentation a drawing was held for items representing the three classifications of beverages discussed.

The Roll Call of Passengers was read by Historian James Callender.

The minutes from the Spring meeting were approved as published in the newsletter.

Treasurer Janita Sullivan reported a balance on hand as of November 15, 2017 of \$96,716 as follows; the Union Bank checking account had a balance

of \$44,755 and the BB&T Investment account had a balance of \$51,961. The 2018 contributions received so far include \$900 for the Mildred Ramos Scholarship Fund and \$461 for the Memorial Fund. Historian James Callender reported that the Virginia Mayflower Society is experiencing a very productive period. Since our Spring meeting we have welcomed 28 new members, including 4 by transfer. One member has transferred out. Additionally, two supplemental applications have been approved. There are currently 20 new applications and 5 supplemental applications pending in Plymouth. We are working with 114 potential new members.

Assistant Historian Cynthia Carlson gave a delightful report on her first visit to Plymouth and General Congress.

Education Committee Chair John Alden Copenhagen gave his report. The objective of the Committee is to continue to advance the relevance of our Society and Pilgrim History by connecting the considerable resource information available through the General Society's website to school systems in the state of Virginia. Standards of Learning objectives required by Virginia Public Schools are being reviewed to identify areas in which the Mayflower website may be useful. Junior Membership Committee Chair James Maloney reported that 23 new Junior members have been welcomed into the Virginia Mayflower Society. Junior membership ends at age 26. Three of our Junior members were in attendance; John Hazelton, Lilly DeSa and Joe DeSa.

Scholarship Committee Chair James Maloney announced that eligibility information and directions on how to apply for the 2018 scholarship are available on the Virginia Mayflower Society website. Today's silent auction has raised a total of \$282 for the Mildred Ramos Scholarship Fund.

Governor Lee Woody reported that, in addition to herself, the Virginia Mayflower Society was represented at the 41st General Congress in Plymouth by FGG Mildred Ramos, and Assistant Historians Cynthia Carlson and Deborah Shea. Governor Woody discussed the goals adopted by the GBOA for the 2017-2020 term. A bronze statue of William Bradford, seated with a quill in hand and a candle with an eternal flame sitting on his table, will be dedicated during the 2020 General Congress commemorating the 400th anniversary of the Mayflower voyage. The 2020 Committee is currently working on the event schedule. Tentative date is September 11-20, 2020.

The next meeting of the Virginia Mayflower Society will be on May 5, 2018 at the Hotel Strasburg, 213 South Holliday Street, Strasburg, Virginia.

Following the Benediction by Elder Nancy Barrow, the meeting adjourned at 2:50 p.m.

2017 Congress Highlights - *Cynthia Carlson*

Attending the 41st Mayflower General Congress was not just meetings and voting. Indeed, the greater portion of our time involved taking tours, browsing book stalls, visiting exhibits, meeting people, and attending great informational sessions.

Beautiful cool, sunny weather welcomed us to the Congress in Plymouth, MA. , held at the Hotel 1620. Deb Shea and I flew into Boston's Logan Airport, and renting a car, drove a little over an hour to Plymouth. Our arrival on Friday allowed us to attend a dinner of the John Howland Society where Deb also made connections with some other Warren descendants. Many pilgrim societies coordinate events to coincide with the Congress.

On Saturday, we joined the Path of the Pilgrim's tour. The busses stopped at the Pilgrim Monument in Provincetown, and from there we visited where pilgrim women first did their laundry, where the men found fresh water, and similar sites. We lunched at the 1875 Orleans Inn overlooking the water. In was another opportunity to meet people from other

states and find more cousins. Every day other tours were offered including those to Newport, RI, and a ghost walk in the cemetery. The Congress is not just meetings and motions; it's a time to bring the family and enjoy the area. The Pilgrim Museum, the Mayflower House, and Plimoth Plantation are worth a visit.

One special time was the church service held at Plimoth Plantation with a buffet breakfast following. Many descendants gathered at the bottom of the hill close to the entrance and waited for the drummer to signal our marching up to the meeting house. Once there, we sang hymns, listened to scripture and a homily. I could see the water stretching away and imagined those first pilgrims meeting together long ago. While there, I participated in a fund-raising effort toward the renovation of the The Mayflower. Much like a time capsule, dowels were provided (for a fee) on which to write a message for future generations. Somehow these will be hammered into the ship. I got my indelible maker and wrote something fantastic—I'm sure—but I don't remember what.

The march Sunday afternoon from the Mayflower Society House to Cole's Hill (monument in remembrance of those who died that first year) to the First Parish Meeting House was a sight to see. Many descendants donned costumes, and a mass of folks filled the streets as we hiked up hill.

Two informational sessions fascinated me. The first was the explanation of the newly researched ancestry of Edward Winslow's wife Susannah White. Caleb Johnson laid out his research and findings. <http://mayflowerhistory.com/white-susanna/> Second, the DNA presentation by FamilyTreeDNA provided an education for me on the uses of DNA. During the breaks from sessions and meetings, various writers, artists, and groups had tables for things to buy or join. Genealogical and historical books were at a discount. That encouraged me to buy a few.

We also ate wonderful meals along the shore taking in the water views. Of course, seafood was a favorite. But the best part of dining was sharing the table with new friends and discussing ancestors, research, and Mayflower concerns.

The Congress closed with a wonderful banquet and more time for celebrating our heritage.

Remember the Congress of 2020 is a 400-year anniversary and plan to attend.

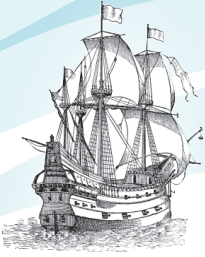
